We seek groups such as but not limited to Boys and Girls Clubs, Recreation programs, Boys and Girl Scouts. We especially seek but are not limited to organizations that administer low income youths. Our goal is to offer an otherwise not affordable experience that will enhance their knowledge of fishing, oceanic ecology, and respect for our natural resources. Our on the water teachers are all Oceanside Senior Anglers, many of which such as myself have spent a lifetime learning using and respecting the local fishery. Our over twenty year history of these on the water experiences have given our community over one thousand youths that have received lifetime benefits from a single day on the water. For the last several years all of our trips have been aboard the Sea Star out of Oceanside Sea Center in Oceanside. Captain Joe on the Sea Star has embraced the program and significantly reduced his prices to allow us greater latitude in reaching greater numbers of Kids. A boat that charts for over \$2000 per day is available for our program for \$1500, all inclusive. 24/25-05 - Mataguay Waterway Improvement 2025 - San Diego- Imperial Council, Scouting America	The Mataguay Waterway Improvement is a multiphase project to repair and protect the inland waterways such as Matagual Creek that run through Mataguay Scout Ranch. The repairs will help prevent erosion and support wildlife, including one endangered species. This phase of the project will focus on completing unfinished work on the waterways. The work will be carried out by volunteers and youth under the guidance of our facilities manager. This phase will see us continue the cleaning of the lake, silt pond, and inland waterways. We hope to start to clear the outlet for the waterway and possibly install a flash board riser or similar device, which will allow the water levels to be manipulated and provide a better biodiversity. We also will add a large lake aerator that will help improve the oxygen levels for animals in the lake. This will improve the quality of life for those animals and help promote healthy biodiversity. The project will restore waterways that support fish, birds, mountain lions, deer, raccoons, bobcats, and coyotes. Our waterways are home to a federally endangered species. The clearing of the waterways will help bolster an already diverse community of wildlife.	4/1/2025	\$6,000
24/25-06 - Trout at the River Studio - The San Diego River Park Foundation	The Trout at the River Studio will educate students about wild rainbow trout in San Diego County. The primary focus are students from urban areas that have often never seen a wild trout, let alone visit inland riparian waterways. One tank and chiller will be bought to be used to raise trout from eggs to a size large enough to release at local waterways. The project is located at the new Grant Park in Mission Valley. It builds on the successful partnership Trout in the Classroom w/ San Diego Fly Fishers. A key part of this effort is to establish internet service at a remote part of Boulder Creek. the location does not currently have cell service. This will enable students to connect w/ real time monitoring equipment at Boulder Creek to learn about healthy streams trout require. A scientist who is at our Boulder Creek Field Station will Zoom in using this satellite service to show the students the creek in real-time and talk with them. A 75" SMART board will be located at the River Studio where the students are located. This will enable not only the group of students to see the scientist, video and streaming data, but also the scientist to see the students. A camera will be placed in the fish tank at the River Studio so when the students return to their class, they can check-in on "their fish" and the learning can continue. The San Diego Fly Fishers will help setup and maintain the fish tank in partnership with the SDRPF staff, interns and volunteers. 25/26-1	Kiwanis of Escondido Childrens Fishing Experience / Kiwanis Club of Escondido	Twice each year Lake Dixon of Escondido hosts a 2- or 3-day Trout Derby. At each derby event the Kiwanis Club of Escondido - Hidden Valley Kiwanis constructs two (2) 20ft x 10ft x 6ft deep netted ponds and stocks them with 300-500 lbs of trout (approximately 1-2 lbs each) at a cost of \$5.00 per pound (\$1500 - \$3000) per event. With the assistance of the Sr. Anglers of Escondido, we invite all children within the North San Diego County under the age of 8 to participate in what we refer to as the "Children's Fishing Experience" The Sr. Anglers of Escondido provide all the fishing gear (or they may use their own) and the expertise. The Kiwanis Club of Escondido - Hidden Valley provides construction materials, nets and fish in support of the effort. Kiwanis has been hosting this activity for approximately 26 years. Between the April 2024 and November Trout Derby we hosted over 310 children. Typically, this event serves 150 - 200 children each event.	\$4,000

25/26-2	Kids Saltwater Fishing Event / San Diego Anglers Foundation	Our Foundation specializes in getting kids (and wounded warriors) out on the ocean on the charter boat fleet out of Seaforth Sportfishing. We concentrate on fishing off the coast of La Jolla, but we also educate the kids about the marine life that is available to see off La Jolla, California. Numerous species of birds, marine mammals such as California sea lions, harbor seals, sometimes we see common dolphins on the way up along with the occasional grey whale. Many of these kids have never been on the ocean before and we take the time to answer all their questions on what they will be seeing. We then educate them on the wonderful sport of inshore saltwater fishing for Calico Bass, Sand Bass, Barracuda, Mackerel, Pacific Bonita, and if we are lucky, the California Yellowtail. As the fish are caught, and sometimes released, we educate the kids on each species and how it fits into the giant kelp beds off La Jolla. We are very happy if we keep the kids so interested that they stay off their cell phones all morning long. On the way in, the kids lucky enough to catch something to eat, we educate them of the proper way to prepare their fish for their family. We also inform them that they can get their families to buy tickets on these open party fishing boats whenever they want.	\$3,000
25/26-3	Assessing Habitat for the Reintroduction of Threatened California Red-Legged Frogs / San Diego Natural History Museum	Once abundant throughout California, including San Diego County, as an important part of our local biodiversity, the California Red-Legged Frog disappeared in the 1970s from our native aquatic fauna within the county. Beginning in 2020, the San Diego Natural History Museum (SDNHM or Museum) and partner organizations have reintroduced the species to the county via yearly stocking of frog eggs to build up multiple generations of new frogs. Excitingly, just this year, we've documented the first wild breeding at our other recovery site in Riverside County. We also detected strong breeding calls in San Diego, but no breeding yet. With the knowledge that our work can be successful, we aim to improve habitat conditions in a variety of ways at our San Diego County site to further encourage natural breeding and self-sufficiency. Our team plans to enhance the pond with aquatic vegetation to facilitate frog egg laying and protective cover, however we don't know 1) how water levels and temperatures fluctuate for planting 2) where invasive bullfrogs are hiding, and 3) how Red-Legged Frogs use the current habitat and where they move. We seek funds for equipment purchases to help us restore habitat and make the best decisions about habitat management at our San Diego County site and help us choose future frog reintroduction sites within the county. As a long-term goal, this project will be successful when frogs in San Diego County begin breeding on their own and become self-sustaining.	\$4,405

The repairs will help prevent erosion and support wildlife, including one endangered species. This phase of the project will focus on completing unfinished work on the waterways. The work will be carried out by volunteers and youth under the guidance of our facilities manager. This phase will see us continue the upkeep of the lake, silt pond, and inland waterways. We hope to start to work on the upper lake and its upkeep. This will improve the quality of life for those animals and help promote healthy biodiversity. The upper lake flows through the creeks and into the lower lake. Its health is key to ensuring the health of all wildlife downstream. Continual upkeep and monitoring will ensure a rich biodiversity of wildlife. The project will restore waterways that support fish, birds, mountain lions, deer, raccoons, bobcats, and coyotes. Our waterways are home to a federally endangered species. The clearing of the waterways will help bolster an already diverse community of wildlife.	\$2,800

Bylaws

~~June 19, 2019 Refer to FWAC Fact Sheet: Change in meeting time to 11:30 a.m.~~

PURPOSE

The San Diego County Administrative Code creates and establishes the San Diego County Fish and Wildlife Advisory Commission to advise the Board of Supervisors, the Chief Administrative Officer and County Departments on procedures, programs and issues pertaining to fish and wildlife as defined in Section 286.8, Duties and Responsibilities. The Commission is responsible for the disbursement of the State Fish and Game Fines and Forfeitures moneys returned pursuant to provisions of Sections 13101 and 13103 of the State Fish and Game Code, in a manner consistent with that Code.

MEMBERSHIP AND SELECTION

The Commission shall consist of ten (10) members demonstrating interest and expertise in fish and wildlife issues, environmental issues, or wildlife management issues. Each Supervisor shall nominate two (2) members, who shall be appointed by the Board of Supervisors. The members shall serve during their terms at the pleasure of the Board of Supervisors and any member may be removed at any time by a majority vote of the Board of Supervisors or by any member's failure to meet the regularly scheduled meeting attendance requirements.

EXCLUSIONS

- (1) An employee of the County shall not serve on the Commission.
- (2) An employee of a State agency with responsibilities directly related to fish and wildlife habitat or game management within the County region shall not serve on the Commission.
- (3) No person shall be appointed to the Commission if by reason of such employment a conflict of interest could arise. Appointment by the court of an attorney to represent an individual shall not be considered a conflict of interest.

TERMS OF OFFICE

Members shall serve a term of office concurrent with the term of office of their nominating Supervisor. The terms shall expire on the date of expiration of the term of the nominating member of the Board of Supervisors or at such time as said member of the Board of Supervisors ceases to hold office, whichever first occurs. Any member whose term has expired hereunder shall continue to discharge the duties as a member until a successor has been appointed and qualified. Any member who submits his or her intent to resign may continue to discharge the duties as a member until a successor has been appointed and qualified. The reelection of a member of the Board of Supervisors for a succeeding term shall not automatically extend the term of any Commission member.

VACANCIES

A vacancy shall occur on the happening of any of the following events before the expiration of the term:

- (1) The death of the incumbent.
- (2) The resignation of the incumbent.
- (3) Unexcused absences from more than one-third of the regularly scheduled meetings in any 12-month period or any three consecutive regularly scheduled meetings.
- (4) Or for any reason specified in Government Code Section 1770.

When a vacancy occurs as the result of missing one-third of the regularly scheduled meetings in one 12-month period or three consecutive regularly scheduled meetings, both the member and the nominating Supervisor shall be notified by the Commission Chairperson. Vacancies shall be filled in accordance with Section 286.1 of the County Administrative Code. Vacancies shall be filled for the balance of the unexpired term of the member being replaced.

ORGANIZATION

- (1) Officers. The Commission shall annually select from its membership a Chairperson, Vice Chairperson and Secretary. The officers shall serve for a calendar year. The Chairpersons shall preside at meetings, sign correspondence on behalf of the Commission and other duties. The Vice Chairperson shall assume the duties of the Chairperson if the Chairperson is not present.
- (2) Rules. The Commission shall prepare and adopt the necessary rules and regulations for the conduct of its business, including regularly updated by-laws, goals and grant guidelines.
- (3) Quorum. A majority of members currently appointed to the Commission shall constitute a quorum. A majority of members in attendance shall be required to carry any motion or approval.

- (4) Minutes. The Commission shall keep written minutes of its meetings, a copy of which shall be filed with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors and the Department of Agriculture, Weights and Measures Parks and Recreation. It shall be the responsibility of the Secretary, or a member appointed by the Chairperson if the Secretary is not present, to keep the minutes and file them with the Department of Agriculture, Weights and Measures Parks and Recreation.
- (5) Meetings. The Commission shall establish a regular meeting schedule and shall give public notice of the time and place of meetings in compliance with the requirements of the Brown Act. All meetings of the Commission shall be open and public and all persons shall be permitted to attend any meetings of the Commission.

The Commission shall meet no less than two times per year. Unless otherwise noted, these meetings shall be held on the second Thursday of each month at 11:30 a.m. If there is a holiday on the scheduled meeting date, the meeting shall be held on the following Thursday. Meetings will be held in January, July and other months as the Commission deems necessary. County Staff shall be present at all meetings where County funds are being recommended for disbursement.

ESTABLISHMENT OF COMMITTEES

- (1) Ad Hoc Committees. The Commission may appoint committees for the purpose of carrying out the functions and duties of the Commission. Any committee appointed shall consist of not fewer than three members, including at least one Commission member. The actions and recommendations of committees shall not be deemed the action of the Commission or its members.
- (2) Volunteer and Consultant Services. The Commission shall engage the services of volunteer workers and consultants without salary as it may find necessary from time to time. Service of an individual as a volunteer worker or as a consultant shall not be considered as service for or employment by the County.

COMPENSATION AND EXPENSES

Members of the Commission shall serve without compensation. Commission members shall be reimbursed for expenses incurred in performing their duties, including mileage reimbursement in accordance with Administrative Code Section 472 and 484, et seq.

DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

The Commission shall have the following duties and responsibilities:

- (1) To develop such criteria, guidelines and evaluation processes as deemed necessary for the distribution of State Fines and Forfeitures moneys in an equitable and regional manner within the parameters set forth by the Fish and Game Code. Programs, and/or projects funded under this program shall demonstrate a benefit to the fish and wildlife of the County of San Diego.

- (2) To disburse these funds in accordance with applicable State guidelines, including provisions of the Fish and Game Code, and monitor project/program progress, completion and evaluation in accordance with established guidelines.
- (3) To develop recommendations to the Board of Supervisors, Chief Administrative Officer, and County Departments as appropriate regarding regionally significant fish and wildlife issues within the County, such as but not limited to habitat control, environmental hazards, effects of planning or recreational use on wildlife and its habitat, and wildlife/game management. Recommendations shall reflect Commission expertise and research which substantiates the Commission's position/recommendation.
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- (5) To review and comment on Policies and Programs from County Departments regarding the impact of such policies or programs on fish and wildlife within the County region.
- (6) To perform such other duties as may be assigned to the Commission by the Board of Supervisors.

REPORTS

The Commission shall make available to the Board of Supervisors its findings and recommendations on fish and wildlife issues, and submit a written semi-annual report of its activities to the Board of Supervisors within 60 days of each semi-annual funding meeting.

STAFF ASSISTANCE

The Chief Administrative Officer shall ensure the provision of the necessary staff and assistance to the Fish and Wildlife Commission. The Department of ~~Agriculture, Weights and Measures~~Parks and Recreation shall provide a staff person to facilitate the work of the Commission. Expenses related to staffing the Commission shall not exceed \$3,000 per fiscal year and shall be reported to the Commission on a monthly basis.

GRANT FUNDING CONSIDERATION

The Commission shall consider all requests for funds at its January and July Meetings. Deadlines for submission of proposals to be considered shall be the first of December and June, respectively.

25/26-9	Nature Explorers Program	County of San Diego Department of Parks and Recreation	The Nature Explorers Program is offered through the Spring Valley and Lakeside REC Clubs through curriculum-based program designed to expose youth to local wildlife areas throughout San Diego County and California, with the goal of increasing knowledge and awareness of nature, biodiversity and sustainability. This program encourages outdoor participation, nature exploration and historical discovery. Nature Explorers Program provides participants opportunities including but not limited to: follow a trail, play in a safe place, camp under the stars, explore bays and beaches, how to recycle and leave no trace, plant a tree, and sustainable fishing. During wildlife area activities, staff focus on identifying learning opportunities for youth by using the curriculum and lesson plans. County of San Diego will use this grant to expand offerings in the Nature Explorers Program. With \$4,000, the Spring Valley and Lakeside REC Clubs will be able to offer 8 outdoor adventure activities in 2026, with 4 events provided at each location. This offering will provide 120 youth the opportunity to gain hands-on experience outdoors, with having 15 participants attending each offering. County of San Diego will use \$500 for each event to use on various program supplies and equipment, entrance and parking passes, and food for participants. In order to promote participation, each event include outdoor education and recreation activities. Over the past year, Lake Dan Henry has experienced its largest algae bloom to date, preventing youth from fishing, canoeing, rowing and other activities vital to their aquatic education. The excess of algae negatively affects wildlife, and particularly the fish. To negate these effects, we plan on investing in/designing a lake rake that can be pulled by cable across the whole lake to remove the algae. This summer was rough on the waterway of Matagual Creek. Several trees have fallen and damaged existing infrastructure. There are many shifters and strainers that need to be removed, but a power pole that delivers power to our nearby ranges has fallen into the entrance of Lake Dan Henry. We plan on using part of the grant money to rent an auger and replace the pole. This prevents it from being a hazard and contaminating the waterway. The last project for which we would use this funding is to repair a retaining wall that has fallen partially into the lake. 25/26-15	San Diego River Park Foundation	Wildlife-Friendly Fencing at Eagle Peak Ranch Pond	Upper Temescal Creek is protected habitat as part of the San Diego River Park Foundation's 450+ acre Eagle Peak Ranch Preserve. It is an essential wildlife corridor, with downstream sections of the creek on the preserve assessed to be a "reference creek" for how a healthy stream should function. However, this freshwater lifeline for the San Diego River watershed's wildlife is threatened. At the headwaters of the creek, habitat disturbance and trampling of the creekbed by regular unauthorized cattle grazing have been identified as a significant threat to this creek. While grazing is not permitted on the property, cattle belonging to adjacent landowners cross into the preserve as there is no access control at the property boundaries. We are seeking a grant to install ~1,500 feet of wildlife-friendly fencing to protect a 3 acre pond on Temescal Creek. Fencing design will allow wildlife to access the creek habitat while excluding unwanted cattle trespass. Fencing nearest gathering areas and recreational trail will be more attractive lodgepole fence and will include interpretive sign. We seek groups like, but not limited to Boys and Girls Clubs, Boys and Girls Scouts and recreational programs. We especially seek, but are not limited to organizations that serve low income youths. Our goal is to provide kids an otherwise not affordable, safe, fun fishing experience where they learn proper boat procedures, ocean safety, fish and game regulations and enhance their exposure to oceanic ecology and respect for our natural resources. Oceanside Senior Anglers volunteers supervise and provide hands-on instruction. Many of them, like myself, have spent a lifetime learning, using and respecting our local fishery. The club engages 4th–8th grade students in field-based experiences, including the annual Lake Cuyamaca Kids’ Derby and Captain Rollo’s Kids at Sea trips, which provide opportunities to learn about local marine ecosystems, conservation ethics, and sustainable fishing practices. The school will also have its 29th annual 4th grade fishing trip to Lake Cuyamaca in May 2026. Through partnerships with local organizations such as Hookup Baits and Lake Cuyamaca, students learn about native fish species, aquatic food webs, and responsible angling techniques.
