1. Grant Applications for Round 2 of Fiscal Year 2024-25. A presentation was made by Chris Nejo for grant 03 and questions from Commissioners were answered regarding this grant Proposal. The Commissioners reviewed and discussed each of the four grant proposals prior to discussion and voting for grant awards. Each grant was voting on individually with the following results:

Grant 03 approved for an award of \$7,425. Motion Made by Commissioner Conrad, Seconded by Commissioner Stovin Passed with 7 Ayes.

Grant 04 approved for an award of \$7,500. Motion Made by Commissioner Reed, Seconded by Commissioner Turigliatto Passed with 7 Ayes.

Grant 05 approved for an award of \$6,000. Motion Made by Commissioner Turigliatto, Seconded by Commissioner Conrad Passed with 7 Ayes.

Grant 06 approved for an award of \$6,332. Motion Made by Commissioner Reed, Seconded by Commissioner Stovin Passed with 6 Ayes and Commissioner Conrad recusing.

24/25-03 - Reconnecting with the Marine Resources - Pala Band of Mission Indians	Many Indigenous Nations, especially in California, have been largely from coastal areas making it difficult to maintain connections to the ocean and the resources it provides. Indigenous peoples have traditionally relied on coastal areas for subsistence, economic livelihood, and cultural spiritual values. Natural resources, such as fish and abalone, hold significant cultural importance. Pala's project aims to reconnect our community, particularly the youth, with the coast and the ocean. By enhancing tribal access to marine resources, we strive to preserve and revitalize our cultural heritage, support sustainable practices, and strengthen our community's bond with the ocean. This initiative will foster a deeper understanding and appreciation of our coastal traditions and ensure their continuation for future generations.	02/08/2025	\$7,425
24/25-04 - Oceanside Senior Anglers 2025 Sponsored Kids Trips - Oceanside Senior Anglers Angler for Kids	OSA sponsors and facilitates fishing trips for local north county youth groups during the summer months. We seek groups such as but not limited to Boys and Girls Clubs, Recreation programs, Boys and Girl Scouts. We especially seek but are not limited to organizations that administer low income youths. Our goal is to offer an otherwise not affordable experience that will enhance their knowledge of fishing, oceanic ecology, and respect for our natural resources. Our on the water teachers are all Oceanside Senior Anglers, many of which such as myself have spent a lifetime learning using and respecting the local fishery. Our over twenty year history of these on the water experiences have given our community over one thousand youths that have received lifetime benefits from a single day on the water. For the last several years all of our trips have been aboard the Sea Star out of Oceanside Sea Center in Oceanside. Captain Joe on the Sea Star has embraced the program and significantly reduced his prices to allow us greater latitude in reaching greater numbers of Kids. A boat that charters for over \$2000 per day is available for our program for \$1500, all inclusive. We have enacted additional cost saving procedures by eliminating meals as kids preferred their own lunches.	6/15/2025	\$7,500

24/25-05 - Mataguay Waterway Improvement 2025	The Mataguay Waterway Improvement is a multiphase project to repair and protect the inland waterways such as Matagual Creek that run through Mataguay Scout Ranch. The repairs will help prevent erosion and support wildlife, including one endangered species. This phase of the project will focus on completing unfinished work on the waterways. The work will be carried out by volunteers and youth under the guidance of our facilities manager.	4/1/2025	\$6,000
San Diego- Imperial Council, Scouting America	This phase will see us continue the cleaning of the lake, silt pond, and inland waterways. We hope to start to clear the outlet for the waterway and possibly install a flash board riser or similar device, which will allow the water levels to be manipulated and provide a better biodiversity. We also will add a large lake aerator that will help improve the oxygen levels for animals in the lake. This will improve the quality of life for those animals and help promote healthy biodiversity.		
	The project will restore waterways that support fish, birds, mountain lions, deer, raccoons, bobcats, and coyotes. Our waterways are home to a federally endangered species. The clearing of the waterways will help bolster an already diverse community of wildlife.		
24/25-06 - Trout at the River Studio - The San Diego River Park Foundation	The Trout at the River Studio will educate students about wild rainbow trout in San Diego County. The primary focus are students from urban areas that have often never seen a wild trout, let alone visit inland riparian waterways. One tank and chiller will be bought to be used to raise trout from eggs to a size large enough to release at local waterways. The project is located at the new Grant Park in Mission Valley. It builds on the successful partnership Trout in the Classroom w/ San Diego Fly Fishers. A key part of this effort is to establish internet service at a remote part of Boulder Creek, the location does not currently have cell service. This will enable students to connect w/ real time monitoring equipment at Boulder Creek to learn about healthy steams trout require. A scientist who is at our Boulder Creek Field Station will Zoom in using this satellite service to show the students the creek in real-time and talk with them. A 75" SMART board will be located at the River Studio where the students are located. This will enable not only the group of students to see the scientist, video and streaming data, but also the scientist to see the students. A camera will be placed in the fish tank at the River Studio so when the students return to their class, they can check-in on "their fish" and the learning can continue. The San Diego Fly Fishers will help setup and maintain the fish tank in partnership with the SDRPF staff, interns and volunteers. More than 1000 students annually are projected to participated in Trout in the Center.	2/1/2025	\$6,332
